to the public. The restoration revived the glory of the Scottish Renaissance, with meticulous repairs, reconstructed turrets, and a charming pink harl exterior. As the ancestral home of Clan Mackenzie, the tower holds a rich history. The Glen Affric Tartan, Scotland Oldest Surviving Tartan under goes carbon dating

The Glen Affric tartan is believed to be the oldest surviving tartan, dating back to the 16th century. Discovered in the Scottish Highlands in the 1980s and preserved in a peat bog, the fabric underwent dye analysis and radiocarbon testing to determine its age. The tartan's colors, consisting of green, brown, and possibly red and yellow, showed no signs of artificial or semi-synthetic materials, indicating a



pre-1750 origin. Carbon dating placed its creation between 1500 and 1655, during the reign of Stuart monarchs.

This rustic cloth, likely used as an outdoor working garment, is a rare find from the 16th century, associated with ordinary people rather than royalty or nobility. Its distinction from the Falkirk tartan, Scotland's previously recognized oldest tartan, lies in its more intricate design with multiple colors and stripes.

The Glen Affric tartan's exhibition at V&A Dundee as part of the "Tartan" exhibition highlights its significance in understanding the textile traditions that influenced modern tartan. Its discovery in a peat bog adds to the remarkable archaeological finds in such environments, while contributing to the preservation and appreciation of Scotland's cultural heritage.

Ambitious Digitization Project aims to revolutionize our understanding of the history of the Jacobites and Scottish Clans

The incorporation of digital humanities methodologies, such as TEI, allows for quantitative analysis, facilitating a deeper understanding of patterns, connections, and networks within the Jacobite era. Dr. Davis and her team place a particular emphasis on voices that have been underrepresented in traditional historical narratives, such as women, Gaelic speakers, and those from laboring class backgrounds. By bringing these marginalized perspectives to the forefront, the project provides a more comprehensive and inclusive understanding of the Jacobite movement and its impact on Clan history.

VS. Clan Graham Famous Clan Feud

In the 16th century, the Armstrong Clan and Graham Clan of Scotland were locked in a bitter conflict. Displaced from their lands by King James V, the Armstrongs settled on Graham-controlled territories, leading to tensions between the two clans.

In 1541, the Grahams, led by Lang Will Graham, murdered three Armstrong brothers. Despite appeals for reconciliation, the Grahams refused to make amends and launched raids along the Scottish border. They burned down Armstrong houses and terrorized villages.

A decisive battle took place near Gilnockie Tower, resulting in heavy casualties. The Armstrongs emerged victorious, driving the Grahams into England. However, the Grahams persisted in their raids, even killing an Armstrong clan leader.

The Armstrongs sought help from the Scottish and English Crowns, but their pleas went unanswered. Feeling abandoned, they took matters into their own hands, killing an Englishman with Graham ties. This sparked the fury of King Henry of England.

King Henry personally punished the Armstrongs in Liddesdale, further straining their relationship with the Scottish Crown. During the English

invasion at Solway Moss in 1542, the Armstrongs refused to fight for Scotland, resulting in their allegiance shifting to the English Crown.




Following England's victory, intermarriage between the Armstrongs and Grahams solidified their bond. This marked a turning point, with fewer disputes between the clans in the mid-16th century.

Historic Clan Castles of Scotland

Stanley Castle

Paisley, Scotland

Stanley Castle is a 15th century castle located in the reservoir of the Paisley Water Works, two miles south of the town. The structure is of the L Plan, with well-preserved exterior walls and an interior that is completely gutted. The doorway is in the re-entering angle, and the ground floor is



pierced with several loops that have an ancient appearance. The walls are built with coursed work, and the parapet has run round the whole castle, with corbelled bartizans at the angles. The castle and barony of Stanley or Stainly belonged in the fourteenth century to the Danzielstons of that ilk, and passed by marriage to Maxwell of Calderwood, and through them in the fifteenth century to the Maxwells of Newark. In 1629, the estate was sold to Lady Ross, and is now the property of the Earl of Glasgow. Close by is an interesting standing stone set in a broad socket. Stanley Castle is a remarkable example of 15th century Scottish architecture and a great example of how castles have been preserved and adapted to their environment over the centuries. Visitors to Stanley Castle can explore the castle and its grounds, take in the spectacular views of the reservoir, and learn about the history of the castle and its inhabitants. There are also a number of events held at the castle throughout the year, including re-enactments, shows, and more.

Johnnie Armstrong - Scottish Raider Famous Scottish Clansmen

Johnnie Armstrong, also known as Johnie Armstrong, was a Scottish raider and folk hero who operated along the Anglo-Scottish border in the early 16th century. He was a member of the Armstrong family, a powerful clan of reivers, or raiders, who made a living by plundering and raiding across the border.

Armstrong led a band of 160 men, despite having no income from rents, and operated under the protection of Robert Maxwell, 5th Lord Maxwell, for some time. However, his activities made the central authority look weak and were a hindrance to diplomacy with England. When King James V took personal control of the situation, Armstrong and his men were dealt with severely as rebels.

In July 1530, Armstrong was captured by the king after he had sent him a letter, requesting his presence at court and promising him safety. Armstrong ordered his men to dress richly and

arrived at court expecting a pardon, but instead the king tried to arrest them. Armstrong ordered his men to fight, but they were all killed. although Armstrong himself was brought down only by treacherous attack from hehind.



He was hanged with 36 of his men at Caerlanrig chapel. Armstrong's story was immortalized in the Child Ballad Number 169, also known as "The Ballad of Johnny Armstrong." The ballad relates the story of Armstrong's encounter with the king and how he was betrayed despite being promised safe conduct. The ballad ends with Armstrong's son vowing revenge while still "on his nurse's knee."

Scottish Clan Myths and Legend

Trinity Temple, Scotland's Oldest University

Trinity Temple, also known as Teampull na Trionaid, is a ruined 13th-century Augustinian nunnery located in Carinish, North Uist, in the Outer Hebrides of Scotland. Its history dates back to the 12th century when Beathag, the daughter of Somerled, a Norse-Gaelic lord, founded the church. Beathag was a Black Nun and is believed to have been prioress of Iona in about 1203. It is said that the church was a college of learning, even considered by some to be the first university in Scotland.



In the 14th century, Amie Mac Ruari, wife of John of Islay, Lord of the Isles, is said to have rebuilt the church after her divorce from her husband. However, during the Scottish Reformation, the families of Roman Catholic priests and those of the tacksmen and Clan Chiefs all attempted to claim Church lands for their own, leading to the ruin of the convent.

The nunnery's ruins today stand as a testimony to its glorious past. Visitors can explore the remains of the church, which includes a graveyard and the carved head of a human figure. The headstone is now preserved in the museum of Taigh Chearsabhagh in Loch nam Madadh.

The Battle of Carinish, which was fought between Clan MacDonald of Sleat and Clan MacLeod of Dunvegan, took place near the ruins of the nunnery in 1601, adding to the historical significance of the site. In the early 19th century, an unknown body washed ashore on the island and was buried by the locals in the temple. Later that day, a mysterious barge with three crew members arrived, opened the grave, and carried off the body into the sea, never to be seen again.

The Battle of Embo, 1245

Famous Clan Battle

The Battle of Embo is a significant event in Scottish history, as it marks the resistance of the Scottish forces against the invading Vikings. The battle took place in the year 1245 in Sutherland, a county in the northern part of Scotland. The Vikings had launched raids and invasions across Europe, including Scotland, where they encountered fierce resistance from the native population.

According to Sir Robert Gordon's account, the

Vikings invaded the northern part of Scotland and were met by a Scottish force led by William de Moravia, 1st Earl of Sutherland. William's servant, Richard de Moravia, bravely held off the Vikings until the earl arrived with a larger force. The Scottish army, though outnumbered, was determined to protect their land and homes from the invading Vikings.

The battle was fierce, with both sides fiercely contesting every inch of ground. The Vikings were known for their ferocity and skill in combat, while the Scottish army fought with bravery and determination. In the end, the Scottish forces emerged victorious, thanks in large part to the bravery and sacrifice of Richard de Moravia. Sir Robert Gordon's account states that the Scottish earl secured the victory by killing the Danish general with the leg of a horse.

While the accuracy of Sir Robert Gordon's account is debatable, it is certain that the Vikings launched several raids and invasions on Scotland during this period. The Vikings were a seafaring people who hailed from the Scandinavian countries of Denmark, Norway, and Sweden. They established colonies and carried out raids across Europe, using their longships to attack coastal settlements and carry out raids.

Scottish Clan Artifacts

The Brooch of Lorn

The Brooch of Lorn was said to have been captured from King Robert the Bruce in 1306 by the Clan MacDougall at the battle of Argyllshire. This battle took place near Dalry Scotland, close to the village of Tyndrum. The feud between Bruce and the Clan MacDougall arose due to the murder of John, Red Comyn, by Robert the Bruce who felt that Comyn stood between him and the crown of Scotland. Comyn was married to the daughter of MacDougall of Lorn, and it was to revenge the death of her husband that the clan attacked Bruce and his followers.

The king was very hard pressed, and had to save his life at the cost of his mantle which, along with the silver brooch that fastened it, was torn from him by the furious pursuers. For generations the brooch was kept by the MacDougalls, both as a trophy gained in fight and as an interesting historical relic.



But in the 17th century, during a raid upon Dunollie Castle, the MacDougalls' stronghold, which was besieged and burned, the brooch was seized with other spoils by Campbell of Bar-Gleann, in whose family it was preserved for two centuries. It was then acquired by General Campbell of Lochnell, who presented it in 1824, to his friend, Sir John MacDougall. Thus it returned to the custody of the chief of the clan, whose ancestors had won it from the Bruce. It was kept safe in the mansion of the MacDougalls, adjoining the timeworn, picturesquely situated castle of Dunollie.
