This "B" listed small fortalice has been thoughtfully restored over the years, preserving its traditional features, including magnificent stonework, fireplaces, timber beams, and original defensive elements such as arrow slits.

Clan Tweedie VS. Clan Flemings Famous Clan Feud

The feud between the Flemings of Biggar and the Tweedies of Drummelzier in 16th-century Scotland centered around the inheritance of Catherine Fraser, heiress of Sir Simon Fraser's substantial estates in Upper Tweeddale. The Fleming clan sought to gain control of these valuable lands by arranging Catherine's marriage to one of their illegitimate sons. In contrast, the Tweedies, led by James Tweedie, aimed to marry Catherine to James, the nephew of their clan chief, thus securing control of the Fraser properties.

Tensions reached a boiling point during a hunting trip when the Tweedies ambushed a small group of Flemings. The altercation resulted in the death of Lord Fleming, and the Tweedies captured his heir, Malcolm. They demanded Catherine Fraser's delivery and the release of Malcolm in exchange for his safe return.

Catherine Fraser, with support from the Flemings, drafted legal documents to protect her interests during this turbulent time. Civil authorities got involved, declaring the Tweedies as criminals and arresting some of their clan members. In an attempt to reconcile, the Tweedies offered their support, services, and even a marriage proposal

between James Tweedie and one of Lord Fleming's sisters.

Ultimately, the Crown declared the Tweedies deserving



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of retribution, leading to the transfer of Tweedie lands to the Flemings. Despite their initial hopes of redemption, the Tweedies could not regain ownership of their properties, leading to their decline.

Caldwell Tower

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The Wolf of Badenoch Alexander Stewart, Earl of Buchan

Alexander Stewart better known as the "Wolf of Badenoch," was a significant and controversial figure in 14th-century Scotland. Born in 1343 as the third son of King Robert II and Elizabeth Mure, he rose to prominence through a combination of royal connections and territorial acquisitions.

Alexander's life was characterized by a turbulent mix of power struggles, territorial disputes, and conflicts with both the church and the Scottish nobility. He held vast territories in the northern regions of Scotland, including Badenoch, Urquhart, and Ross, often acquiring them through marriages and political maneuvers. However, his rule was marked by ruthless and controversial actions.

The Battle of Tuiteam Tarbhach, 1406 Famous Clan Battle

The Battle of Tuiteam Tarbhach, also known as Tuttim-Tarwach, occurred in 1406 in Scotland and pitted the Mackays against the MacLeods of Lewis. The conflict ignited when the MacLeods conducted a raid on Mackay lands in Strathnaver. In response, the Mackays, with assistance from Alexander Murray of Cubin and Earl of Sutherland's men, pursued the raiders to reclaim their stolen property. The battle unfolded on the north bank of the River



Oykel, resulting in a fierce confrontation.

Leading the Mackays was Hugh Mackay, often called Black Hugh or Uistean Dow, who served as a regent for his nephews Angus Dow and Rory Gald, heirs of his deceased brother Angus Mackay. The Mackays emerged victorious in the battle, annihilating the MacLeods, save for one survivor who conveyed the news of the defeat to Lewis before succumbing to his wounds.

Angus Dow eventually succeeded his uncle Hugh as the chief of the Mackays. Despite a subsequent defeat at the Battle of Dingwall in 1411 against Donald, Lord of the Isles, Angus Dow's leadership brought prosperity and expansion to the Mackays. He commanded a formidable force of 4,000 men and earned the moniker "Angus the Absolute."

The battlefield was once marked by cairns, though they have since been dismantled for dry stone walls. A cemetery on the hillside east of the battlefield is said to incorporate stones from these cairns. Today, the A837 road runs through the historic site, preserving the memory of this significant clan battle in Scottish history.

Scottish Clan Artifacts

The Seal of Sir John Campbell

The seal of Sir John Campbell, unearthed at Dunyvaig Castle on Islay, has added a significant layer to Scotland's history.
